

He has performed in Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, Croatia, Hungary, Italy, Serbia, and throughout the United States. He is an advocate of new music, and his repertoire includes works by Balkan and American composers, some of whom have written duets for him and his wife, Dr. Sangmi Lim. He has given presentations at a number of national and state conferences. including the Music Teachers National Association, the Texas Music Teachers Association Convention and the Music and Lifelong Learning Symposiums. He has presented on the importance of music education for all. In the spirit of community building, Mulić is a proponent of bringing together university faculty, independent music teachers, and local and national music organizations to celebrate the artistry of piano performance. In 2010, Mulić founded the Sarajevo Chamber Music Festival, which features a week of concerts by world-renowned artists, as well as a tenday educational program for young chamber musicians. Mulic's proudest achievement is the creation of Piano Celebration Week at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. This annual festival features internationally renowned pianists, and the best and brightest young musicians from throughout the Coastal Bend, Central, and South Texas regions. This festival has transformed the piano community of Corpus Christi and inspired hundreds of budding pianists. Mulić has held faculty positions at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and at the University of Sarajevo. He is currently an Associate Professor of Music (Piano) at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. He also serves as a faculty member at the New England Music Camp in Sidney, Maine, where he teaches applied piano and chamber music. Mulić lives in Corpus Christi with his wife Sangmi, and their two children, Luka and Ella.

Joyce Albrecht Wilcox, BA, MChM, teaches piano, organ, music theory and directs

handbells in Corpus Christi. She recently retired as director of music at Parkway Presbyterian Church where she played organ, piano, directed handbells and children's music.

A university piano scholar at the age of seven, and a philharmonic orchestral soloist at the age of eleven, Philippine-born pianist, Dinzin Nacino Broñola-Rada exhibited musical prowess in her early years. By the age of twelve she was accepted in an art school for a four year scholarship and at sixteen was living in Europe, learning and mastering her technique, performing in Germany and France and even studying at Bulgaria's prestigious State Academy of Music. She went on earning her undergraduate and graduate degrees as a full scholar from the Philippines' royal and pontifical UST Conservatory and South Carolina's Winthrop University before engaging in a career of teaching and performing. Her recognitions include awards for "Outstanding Performance in the Arts" and "Academic Excellence", "first prize" in the Philippines' National Music Competitions for Young Artists and the "Young Achievers Award for Culture and the Arts." She attributes her achievements mainly to her mentors: Professors Asuncion Laureola, Perla Suaco, Stella Dimitrova, and Eugene Barban. Mrs. Dinzin, as she is fondly


