
Along with the other sponsors of Piano Celebration Week, we are proud to host this remarkable event and are pleased you are watching and enjoying wonderful music making over a period of several days.

Dr. Sangmi Lim, a native of the Republic of Korea, is an active performer, appearing frequently as a soloist, chamber musician and collaborative pianist. She earned her Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Piano Performance from Ewha Womans University in Korea and also Master's degree in Collaborative Piano and Doctoral degree in Piano Performance from Michigan State University.

Lim's international presence extends from the Republic of Korea, Japan, Italy, Bosnia and Herzegovina to throughout the United States. Lim appeared as soloist with the Kankakee Valley Symphony Orchestra (IL), the Michigan State University Symphony Orchestra (MI), Jackson Symphony Orchestra (MI), the Algeu Symphony (Germany), and the Kyounggi Philharmonic Orchestra (Republic of Korea). She has given solo recitals and chamber music performances in concert series and festivals such as the Renaissance Festival (Italy), South Hampton Music Festival (New York), Schubertiade (Chicago), West Circle Series (MI), Lansing Symphony Chamber Music Series (MI), Absolute Music Chamber Series (MI) the Rising New Star Concert Series (Republic of Korea), Live Concert Series with Arirang TV (Republic of Korea) and Sarajevo Chamber Music Festival (Bosnia and Herzegovina). Lim served as an adjudicator at many piano competitions including Atlantic Music Festival Piano Concerto Competition (ME), Bolz Young Artist Competition (WI), Ann Arbor Society for Musical Arts Young Artist Competition (MI), Austin District Music Teachers Association Solo Contest (TX), and Michigan Music Association Competition (MI).

Lim served as an Assistant Professor of Piano at Michigan State University and Lansing Community College. Currently, she holds the position of the collaborative pianist at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi and an artist faculty at New England Music Camp. Additionally, she is a co-director of Piano Celebration Week at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi.

A native of Sarajevo, pianist Dino Mulić is a Yamaha Artist with a fascinating history. He grew up in Bosnia-Herzegovina during the war of the 1990s. His passion for music survived the adversities of those years, instilling in him a strong work ethic and a keen sense of determination and persistence. He studied at the Academy of Music in Sarajevo and then at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where he earned his doctoral degree in piano performance and pedagogy. His most influential teachers include pianists Christopher Taylor, Svetlana Chlaidze and Ruben Dalibaltayan, and cellists Parry Karp and Yevgeny Xaviereff.

Mulić is an active recitalist, chamber musician, clinician, and adjudicator. He has performed in Austria, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, Croatia, Hungary, Italy, Serbia, and throughout the United States. He is an advocate of new music, and his repertoire includes works by Balkan and American composers, some of whom have written duets for him and his wife, Sangmi Lim. He has given presentations at a number of national and state conferences including the Music Teachers National Association, the Texas Music Teachers Association Convention and the Music and Lifelong Learning Symposiums. He has presented on the importance of music education for all. In the spirit of community building, Mulić is a proponent of bringing together university faculty, independent music teachers, and local and national music organizations to celebrate the artistry of piano performance.

Mulić possesses remarkable organizational skills and is a reputable concert presenter, having founded the Sarajevo Chamber Music Festival in 2010. This festival features a week of concerts by world-renowned artists, as well as a ten-day educational program for young chamber musicians. Mulić's proudest achievement is the creation of Piano Celebration Week, an annual piano festival at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. This festival features internationally renowned pianists, and the best and brightest young musicians from throughout the Coastal Bend, Central, and South Texas regions. This festival has transformed the piano community of Corpus Christi and inspired hundreds of budding pianists.

Mulić has held faculty positions at the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, and at the University of Sarajevo. He is currently an Assistant Professor of Music at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi. He also serves as a faculty member at the New England Music Camp in Sidney, Maine where he teaches applied piano and chamber music.

### Two Pieces for Piano, 4 Hands

Two Pieces for Piano, 4 hands was written in 1985 at the request of pianist Robert Jordan who was on the faculty of the State University of New York at Fredonia. The pieces were written for his students. I am a graduate of Fredonia State and grew up in that area (Western New York State). Each is a reflection of emotions caused by sights that have an almost supernatural quality. Lights From Across The Lake was inspired by a view from the south shore of Lake Erie where I could see the lights marking the entrance to the Welland Canal. They were just above the curve of the earth. A Winter Rhapsody was inspired by the ghost-like way the wind would push the snow are bushes and trees at night in the winter and form drifts.

### Mark Francis

### Executive Director, Corpus Christi Symphony Orchestra

Mark Francis' musical career has varied from teaching, composing, performing, and writing to orchestral administration. He has studied composition with Walter Hartley and James Eversole, and guitar with Joanne Castellani, Clare Callahan and Joseph Fratianni. He holds a D.M.A. in composition from the University of Kentucky and has taught at Mississippi State University, Louisiana School for Math, Science and the Arts, Centenary College, Northwestern State University, Emory University, University of




Kentucky, Agnes Scott College, Midwestern State University, Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi and Power Academic and Performing Arts Complex. He has received 10 ASCAP Standard Awards and 7 ASCAP Plus Awards for his compositions. His works has been performed internationally and have been part of the Corcoran Gallery Contemporary Music Series in Washington, D.C. The Jackson State University Orchestra premiered his composition on the words of Martin Luther King, Jr., The Trumpet of Conscience, at the Library of Congress in 2007. Conners Publications and Imagine Music publish his compositions. He has frequently contributed to the contemporary music journal, 21st Century Music, reviewing concerts and recordings. His Second Guitar Concerto, recorded in Greece, was released on Navona Recordings in 2019. He is past President of the Southeastern Composers League and Board Member for composition for the College Music Society, South Chapter. Presently, he is Executive Director of the Corpus Christi Symphony Orchestra.

### **Latin Pieces for Piano Duet**

Daewon Kim, M. F. A.

Daewon Kim is an award-winning film director, editor and animator whose projects have screened at festivals across the globe. His goals as a film maker are to create visual experiences that allow audiences to enjoy surreal scenes that are possible in only in the cinema, while revealing a deeper truth about reality. The audience experiences extraordinary and meaningful moments -- impossible in real life - through these visual and auditory experiences. In these moments, he believes the director has a unique opportunity to deliver powerful messages using his or her capacity to manipulate images and sounds and with the power of the imagination. This is a beauty that only film and video can produce. He received a master of fine arts degree from San Francisco State University and he teaches courses as Assistant Professor in the area of Media Production at Texas A&M University-Corpus Christi, especially focused on Post-Production such as Editing, Sound Design, Color Correction, Animation and Visual Effects.

# Nutrition for Pianists: Joint Health, Performance Anxiety, Energy Levels, and More!

Did you know that what you eat can affect your joint health, performance anxiety levels, endurance, mental focus, immunity to diseases, and more? Certified Nutritional Therapy Practitioner and Assistant Professor at Indiana University of Pennsylvania Dr. Evan Engelstad shares nutrition guidance for pianists. He delves into the following topics: (1) choosing healthful foods; (2) the importance of digestion to overall health; (3) how nutrition can relate to common musician health challenges; and (4) recipes for two traditional foods that every pianist should eat regularly.

Dr. Evan Engelstad is an Assistant Professor of Music at Indiana University of Pennsylvania, where he teaches private piano lessons, Class Piano, Jazz Piano, and Piano Pedagogy. Engelstad also teaches piano lessons for the IUP Community Music School, accompanies university choirs, and serves as rehearsal pianist and musical director for opera and musical theater productions.

Engelstad holds a BA in music and physics from Willamette University and has earned MM (Piano Performance) and DMA (Piano Performance and Pedagogy) degrees from the University of Wisconsin–Madison. In addition to performing solo and collaborative classical music, Engelstad enjoys playing gospel, salsa, and jazz keyboard styles. Engelstad is also certified as a Nutritional Therapy Practitioner and helps busy musicians take control of their health through nutrition and lifestyle support.



## The Self-Compassionate Musician: Strategies to Promote Well-Being in Difficult Times

With the prolonged uncertainty we are experiencing, many of us are feeling anxious, emotionally exhausted and stressed out. This interactive session will explore practical ways that we can engage in acts of self-compassion and self-love to break the cycles of stress and feel more grounded. By noticing when we are self-critical, trying to "soften" the critical voice with compassion and without judgment, and reframing the dialogue in a gentler, more positive way, we can observe compassionately our thoughts and emotions, without accepting them as factual. This can lead to greater balance, clarity and equanimity. Self-compassion helps us to embrace our humanness, our sense of connectedness, and helps us to see ourselves more clearly, promoting healing and allowing us to respond with real curiosity.

Jessica Johnson serves on the piano faculty at the University of Wisconsin-Madison as Professor of Piano and Piano Pedagogy, where in 2006, she was the recipient of UW-Madison's prestigious Emil Steiger Distinguished Teaching Award for excellence in teaching. Johnson frequently commissions and programs contemporary solo and chamber works, regularly performing with Sole Nero, a piano and percussion duo with Anthony Di Sanza, percussion. An advocate for the adoption of the Donison-Steinbuhler (DS) Standard, offering alternatively-sized piano keyboards, her upcoming recording project features twenty-first century works by women performed on the DS5.5™ ("7/8") keyboard.



An active clinician, she has given workshops and presentations at the European Piano Teachers Association International Conference, World

Piano Pedagogy Conference, ISME, MTNA, CMS, Performing Arts Medicine Association (PAMA), National Conference on Keyboard Pedagogy (NCKP), Portland International Piano Festival, as well as held residencies at major universities and colleges throughout North America, Europe and China. Johnson has articles published in American Music Teacher, Piano Journal of the European Piano Teachers Association, Piano Magazine, and Piano Pedagogy Forum. She is a three-time winner of American Music Teacher's Article of the Year Award for "Feeling the Sound: Reflections on Claiming One's Own Musical Voice" (2014), "The Art of Listening with Depth, Understanding, Flow and Imagery" (2007), and "Awakening Rhythmic Intuition and Flow in the Developing Pianist" (2019).

A devoted teacher, Johnson's students have secured teaching positions in the U.S., Canada, Europe and Asia. Passionate about community engagement and arts outreach, she serves as Director of Piano Pioneers, a program that brings high quality piano instruction to low-income community members and at-risk youth in Wisconsin. She holds the DMA and MM from the University of Michigan, and the BM from East Carolina University.

# Playing Deliciously: The Legacy and Teachings of Dorothy Taubman

Great American piano pedagogue Dorothy Taubman (1917-2013) was a pioneer in the field of musician's wellness. One of the first teachers to observe piano technique from the perspective of biomechanics, she developed a comprehensive technical approach which has helped hundreds of pianists recover from injury. She believed that piano playing should feel "delicious and euphoric." This session offers an overview of Taubman's life and outlines her core principles and techniques.

Pianist Benjamin Steinhardt enjoys an international reputation for his innovative teaching and regularly performs in the New York metro area. Placing an emphasis on creativity and exploration his teaching incorporates concepts from the Taubman Approach, Music Learning Theory, Dalcroze, and somatic education to give students the tools to reach their highest potential. His writings and webinars have been featured on the MTNA, American Music Teacher, Clavier Companion, TheCuriousPianoTeachers.org, and iPianoTeacher.com.

An artist of great versatility, Steinhardt is equally at home as pianist in the concert hall, and as conductor in the orchestra pit. Recital and chamber performances as a pianist include Zankel and Weill Recital Halls at Carnegie Hall, Merkin Hall, and Greenwich Music House. Work as a musical director includes Queens Theater in the Park, the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, the New York Musical Theater Festival, Bravo television and cabaret spaces throughout NYC including The Metropolitan Room, Studio 54, and Birdland. Steinhardt is Treasurer of the Connecticut State Music Teacher's Association and co-administers "The Art of Piano Pedagogy," an online community for professional piano teachers with well over 23,000 members.

Those mere few minutes were enough to make me leave ballet after eight years and begin to play the flute. I cannot express the pleasure and thrill which I felt upon the first real contact with my instrument. That magic has continued all my life."

Named the "Musician of the Year for 2018" by the Well-Tempered Ear, Serbian flutist Dr. Iva Ugrčić is one of the most exciting and adventurous young flutists in the international pantheon. Described as "a natural star on her instrument," Iva has been featured as a solo artist as well as a chamber and orchestral musician at numerous music festivals and concerts, performing throughout Europe and North America. Additionally, she has performed



and recorded with numerous jazz, blues and alternative music ensembles. A fearless musician, she is enthusiastic about music of all styles and nationalities.

Dr. Ugrčić is a musician who has worn many hats throughout her professional career: flutist, educator, activist, executive and artistic director, entrepreneur, freelance musician and recording artist, among others. After completing her studies in Belgrade and Paris, Iva moved to the USA to finish her Doctor of Musical Arts degree at UW-Madison as a recipient of a prestigious Collins Fellowship. Since then, Iva won the Shain Irving Competition, multiple concerto competitions, and received the James Smith Orchestra Award for excellency and leadership. Additionally, she won the C.R.E.A.T.E. Project Competition at the 46th National Flute Association (NFA) Convention, was awarded First Prize award from The American Prize, Second Prize at the UW Arts Business Competition, Silver Medal at the International Vienna Competition, and was a finalist for the Pro Musicis International Award in NYC.

Dr. Ugrcic currently serves as the Artistic Director of the Rural Musicians Forum, is a member of the Career & Artistic Development Committee of the NFA and holds the position of Board Liaison & Strategic Initiatives role at Overture Center for the Arts, largest nonprofit preforming arts center in Wisconsin. As an entrepreneur, Dr. Ugrčić is the Founder & CEO/Artistic Director of LunART, an international nonprofit organization whose mission is to continue to support, inspire, promote, and celebrate women in the arts through public performances, exhibitions, workshops, and interdisciplinary collaboration.

### Make Constellations Out of the Stars: What You Can Do Now to Excel at Music Theory and Integrate it with Your Musicianship

Audience members will walk away with practical strategies for preparing to succeed in collegiate music theory courses, as well as ideas for how to make music theory an integrated part of their everyday musicianship as performers.

Michael Callahan is associate professor of music theory in the College of Music at Michigan State University, where he has taught since 2010 and served as area chairperson of music theory since 2014.

Callahan's accomplishments as a teacher have been recognized at both the university and the college level. He received the Dortha J. and John D. Withrow Award for Excellence in Teaching (2020); the prestigious university-wide Teacher-Scholar Award (2014), which recognizes outstanding achievement among early-career faculty; and the Lilly Teaching Fellow (2013-14), which permitted him to explore the Scholarship of Teaching and Learning as part of an interdisciplinary cohort. Both the fellowship and a Humanities and Arts Research Program grant seeded the design of a



new curricular method that infuses active, hands-on music making into all of his undergraduate and graduate music theory teaching. He currently coordinates the first-year aural skills curriculum and teaches graduate workshops in music theory pedagogy, keyboard skills, and counterpoint.

Callahan's research deals with music theory pedagogy, particularly through various forms of music-making and improvisation; eighteenth-century counterpoint; the Great American Songbook; and texted music more generally. With Gordon Sly, he co-edited Twentieth- and Twenty-First-Century Song Cycles for Voice and Piano: Analytical Pathways Toward Performance (Routledge, 2020), and he is a co-author, with Steven Laitz, of a leading undergraduate music theory textbook, The Complete Musician, beginning with its fifth edition (forthcoming in 2022). He has published articles and reviews in journals such as Music Theory Online, Music Theory Spectrum, Theory and Practice, Integral, the Journal of Music Theory Pedagogy, and Music Performance Research, as well as chapters in several edited volumes.

Committed to outreach and engagement, Callahan enjoys sharing his insight about musical works with concert audiences in the Lansing area. In addition, he performs occasionally on harpsichord and piano. He currently serves the music theory discipline as a member of the Society for Music Theory Publication Awards Committee and as a reader for the Advanced Placement Music Theory exam. Callahan earned a B.A. in music, summa cum laude, from Harvard University (2004) and both an M.A. (2008) and a Ph.D. (2010) in music theory from the Eastman School Music, where he was awarded the Edward Peck Curtis Award for Excellence in Teaching by a Graduate Student, the Jack L. Frank Award for Excellence in Community Teaching, the Teaching Assistant Prize, and the Alfred Mann Dissertation Award.

### Ways to Improving Sight-Reading Skill at the Piano

Acquiring Peripheral Vision in reading music along with understanding of basic musical knowledge is significant in improving an ability to sight-read. This lecture will examine few ways to help pianists mastering the art of sight-reading. It also explains some benefits of having a better sight-reading skill.

Described as "possesses the utmost in technique, mature musicianship, and intellect" by the New York Concert Review and "simply incredible" by Corpus Christi's Caller-Times, pianist David Sutanto gained his international recognition when he won the 1997 Artists International Audition in New York, which resulted in his critically acclaimed New York recital debut at the Carnegie Recital Hall in 1998. Other awards include winner of the 1996 Chopin Foundation Piano Competition in NY, recipient of the Arthur B. Whitney Award in Boston, top prize winner of the National Yamaha Piano Competition in Indonesia, among others.

Dr. Sutanto is an active performer as piano soloist and chamber musician including performing a duo-piano with his wife, Dr. Shao-Shan Chen. He has performed and taught master classes



throughout the United States, Indonesia, Singapore, Taiwan, and the Dominican Republic. His performance was also broadcast at WAIF-FM in Cincinnati (Asian American Hour), KEDT-FM and KIII-TV stations in Corpus Christi.

As piano collaborator, Dr. Sutanto has worked with artists such as Yo-Yo Ma, Sarah Chang, Julius Baker, Anthony Gigliotti, and Erick Friedman. In addition to performing and teaching, he has served as an adjudicator at the Gloriamus Piano Competition in Indonesia, South Texas Music Competition, 5th Singapore Performers' Festival & Chamber Music Competition, and US New Star Piano Competition, among others. He has received his education from The Boston Conservatory, Manhattan School of Music, and University of Cincinnati. Dr. Sutanto currently serves as Professor of Piano at Del Mar College.

## Sustainable Creativity: Preparing for Competitions, and Enjoying It

Preparation for piano competitions can be a nerve wracking, exhausting, and sometimes frustrating experience. We'll try to establish a fresh perspective on the process, and work toward an approach that is invigorating, productive, and most importantly, sustainable in the long run.

Alexander Beyer, 26, has received warm praise for his performances nationally and internationally. In 2016, he received Third Prize in the Queen Elisabeth Competition, and was named one of five finalists of the American Pianists Association Awards. Recently, he has been a guest soloist with the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, the Brussels Philharmonic, the National Orchestra of Belgium, the Royal Orchestra of Wallonia, and the Irish National Symphony Orchestra. Performances have brought him to Greece, Slovakia, Holland, Belgium, France, Germany, and across the United States. He received Sixth Prize



at the 2015 US Chopin Competition. He was the recipient of Third Prize, as well as the Beethoven and Irish National Symphony Orchestra special awards at the 2015 Dublin International Piano Competition. He was a 2012 US Presidential Scholar in the Arts.

He has studied with Yoshie Akimoto, Matti Raekallio, as well as Wha Kyung Byun and Russell Sherman at the New England Conservatory, having graduated in 2017 with a BA in Mathematics from Harvard.

He has worked with conductors Eric Jacobsen, Gerard Schwarz, Matthew Kraemer, Stephane Denève, Marin Alsop, Paul Meyer, Federico Cortese, Alan Buribayev, Grzegorz Nowak, Constantine Kitsopolous, T. Francis Wada, Carolyn Kuan, Leif Bjaland, and Gustav Meier. He has recently collaborated with the Borromeo Quartet, the Pacifica Quartet, and baritone Andrew Garland. He has performed in the Palais des Beaux Arts, Flagey Studio 4, the Irish National Concert Hall, Baryshnikov Arts Center, Paul Hall, Stamford Palace Theater, Weill Recital Hall, the New World Center and Woolsey Hall.

### The Seven Deadly Performance Sins: A Guide to Overcoming Performance Anxiety

In order to give a magnificent performance, we must PRACTICE giving a magnificent performance. The only way to do this is by regularly and deliberately creating pressure situations in which we can practice NOT committing the performance sins. Covering everything from dealing with wrong notes to wardrobe selection, this entertaining session not only breaks down the elements of successful and unsuccessful performances, but also outlines how one can give a truly moving performance every time, no matter how basic or complex the recital piece.

Samantha Coates is an internationally regarded piano pedagogue and presenter. In addition to running an active teaching studio, she is the creator and publisher of BlitzBooks, the music education series that has brought laughter and creativity to music theory, sight reading, and piano repertoire. Samantha's sense of humour and ability to connect with students through her books and online resources reflect her ongoing dedication to making all areas of music accessible, enjoyable and memorable.



Samantha's passion is holistic music education. She embraces a repertoire-rich and multi-skilled approach to piano, prioritising the teaching

of vital skills such as improvisation, composition and ensemble playing – all of which allow for recreational music making in the future.

In 2017 Samantha suffered with tendonitis in her left arm, which was the catalyst for an overhaul of her technical approach to piano playing and consequently that of all her students. Her involvement with the Taubman approach to piano technique inspired her to develop an entire repertoire series (roterepertoire.com) dedicated to help students learn to sight-read in the context of pianistically ergonomic, comfortable and satisfying repertoire.

Samantha holds a Bachelor of Music degree (Sydney Conservatorium) as well as several performance diplomas. She is well known for her entertaining presenting style, and is regularly invited to speak at conferences around the world on a wide range of pedagogical topics. Samantha has never lost touch with what students want; she has been running her piano studio in Sydney for over three decades and is passionate about helping students to work towards the goal of a lifetime association and love of music.

In her spare time Samantha enjoys giving volunteer recitals in nursing homes, power walking along coastlines, watching Disney movies with her grown-up children, and eating dark chocolate.


# How to Play the Piazzolla Music: The Codes Behind the Scores

In this masterclass Paulina Fain will go thought the codes that should be know when playing tango music and Piazzolla music as well, having in mind that all codes developed throughout the history of tango are the same taken by Piazzolla. A summary of the highlights will be shown by listening to some of his playings and reading at his scores.

Flutist and composer Paulina Fain is one of the most prominent tango pedagogues in the world. She is the director of the Método de Tango series, a unique series of bilingual instrumental method books that teaches to musicians worldwide how to play tango music. She is also the author of The Flute in Tango volume in that series.

She is also the director of Tango For Musicians, the worldwide leading tango workshop for musicians. The educational program is carried out annually in the United States and Europe, in collaboration with the most prestigious institutions in each continent: Reed College in Portland, Oregon, USA, University of Music and Performing Arts Graz, Graz, Austria, Hochschule für Musik Carl Maria von Weber, Dresden, Germany.

Each edition attracts participants from all over the Americas, Europe and Asia who are excited to learn, explore and experiment with tango music.



Fain has presented concerts and master classes throughout the world and directs together with her husband, pianist, composer and director Exequiel Mantega, the Buenos Aires-based nonprofit arts organization Tango Sin Fin, which promotes Argentine music and music education locally and internationally. As a performer, she has toured widely with Mantega as the Duo Fain-Mantega, a group that explores the limits of the genre and has established a new role and sound for the flute in tango.

# Making a Spectacle of Themselves: Prominent Female Keyboardists in Western History

In February 2020, critics unleashed their fury upon Yuja Wang for wearing dark-colored spectacles throughout her concert in Vancouver. Norman Lebrecht, as well as conductor Tania Miller (who later apologized) led the charge. Miller, in particular, bemoaned how the glasses and her demeanor "shut the audience out" and felt like "rejection" of the audience's need for access to the artist. For other critics, notably after her 2011 performance at the Hollywood Bowl, Wang has been accused of being too available to audiences with her penchant for stylishly short hemlines. In this talk, I use Wang's sartorial choices and her critical reception as a window into the preoccupations with women's comportment, dress, and, by extension, morality that have beleaguered female keyboardists from the Renaissance to today. As music institutions invest more visibly in diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging, it's essential to examine the conceptual frameworks, systems, and institutions that have created barriers for female-identifying musicians in Western classical keyboard performance, as well as to pay homage to the women who have nevertheless managed to secure public performing careers and even adulation. I will briefly explore the careers of several female pianists that represent a range of identities.

Marcie Ray is an Associate Professor of Musicology at the Michigan State University College of Music. Her monograph Coquettes, Wives, and Widows: Gender Politics in French Baroque Opera and Theater (Boydell & Brewer) was published in 2020, supported by MSU's HARP production grant and the James R. Anthony Fund from the American Musicological Society. Her other work can be found in Música em Perspectiva, Early Music, American Music, and Engaging Students: Essays in Music Pedagogy. She has won several grants and awards for her teaching including a Lilly Teaching Fellowship, a Creating Inclusive Excellence Grant, the Dortha J. and John D. Withrow Excellence in Teaching Award, and the Fintz Award for Teaching Excellence in the Arts and Humanities

He performed at major music festivals such as: Salzburg Festival, Austria; Gilmore Keyboard Festival, Ravinia Festival, USA; Ruhr Festival, Germany; Ravenna Festival, Stresa Festival, Maggio Musicale Festival in Florence, MITO Festival, Italy; Rachmaninoff and Tchaikovsky festivals through Pittsburgh Symphony. His performances were also heard in Grande Auditorio at Temporada Gulbenkian de Musica in Lisbon, Portugal; at Teatro la Fenice, Venice; Italy; Stadt-Casino Musiksaal in Basel, Switzerland; Salle Cortot in Paris, France; at Dame Myra Hess series in Chicago; Segerstrom Hall in California.

In November 2007, Dr. Savitski became first pianist who performed in an unprecedented live performance and press conference, from his home in South Bend, Indiana on a Yamaha Disklavier piano that was connected to another Disklavier piano in the Recital Hall of Yamaha Artist Services International in New York City. He is a Yamaha Artist. Edisher Savitski is the first prizewinner of the Third International Piano-E-Competition in 2006 and the Hilton Head International Piano Competition in 2001, and took top prizes at the First International Piano-E-Competition in Minneapolis and the William S. Byrd International Piano Competition in Michigan. In 2007 Savitski's CD was released on Schubert Club's Ten Thousand Lakes label. His performances are frequently broadcasted on live TV and radio throughout Europe and USA.

Born in Tbilisi, Georgia, Dr. Edisher Savitski studied in the Central Music School under Maya Beridze and in the Tbilisi State Conservatory under professor Nana Khubutia. During this time, he became a prizewinner of the international charity program "New Names", Russia, and won collaborative piano competition arranged at the Tbilisi State Conservatory. In 1998 he joined the renowned Alexander Toradze Piano Studio at the Indiana University South Bend, where he earned Master's degree, Artist diploma and has been awarded with the Performers Certificate.

In Spring 2013 he earned Doctor of Musical Arts degree in performance from Michigan State University. Dr. Savitski is an assistant professor at the University of Alabama School of Music. As a clinician he regularly conducts master classes throughout USA, Europe and China.
